New Jersey Communicable Disease Reporting Requirements and Contact Information



Public Health
Prevent. Promote. Protect.

To protect public health, certain diseases and conditions are required to be reported in a timely manner by specific health care providers, administrators, and laboratory directors (see New Jersey Administrative Code 8:57 and 8:58).

Health care providers required to report: physicians, advanced practice nurses, physician assistants, and certified nurse midwives.

Administrators required to report: persons having control or supervision over a health care facility, correctional facility, school, youth camp, child care center, preschool, or institution of higher education.

Laboratory directors: For specific reporting guidelines, review the back of this page and see NJAC 8:57-1.7.

Reporting Guidelines

1. Reporting entities are required to report cases of communicable disease to the local health department in which the patient resides.
2. If unable to reach the Ocean County Health Department, contact the NJ Department of Health and Senior Services.
3. If the individual does not live in NJ, report to the NJ Department of Health and Senior Services.

Report content should include: Disease, patient demographics, illness onset, reporting entity contact information, and other pertinent notes.

CONFIRMED or SUSPECT CASES TELEPHONE IMMEDIATELY to the LOCAL HEALTH DEPARTMENT

- Anthrax
- Botulism
- Brucellosis
- Diphtheria
- Foodborne intoxications (including, but not limited to, ciguatera, paralytic shellfish poisoning, scombroid, or mushroom poisoning)
- *Haemophilus influenzae*, invasive disease

- Influenza, novel strains only such as the 2009 influenza A (H1N1) virus
- Measles

REPORTABLE WITHIN 24 HOURS OF DIAGNOSIS to the LOCAL HEALTH DEPARTMENT

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LABORATORY REPORTING GUIDELINES ACCORDING to NJAC 8:57—1.7

Lab directors to report the following within 72 hours, except for those listings with an asterisk (*) which should be reported **immediately** by phone

Lab directors to submit positive specimens of the following to NJDHSS within 72 hours

- *Escherichia coli 0157:H7*
- *Haemophilus influenzae* – CSF, blood
- *Legionella pneumophila*
- *Listeria monocytogenes*
- *Neisseria meningitides*
- *Salmonella spp.*
- *Shigella spp.*
- *Streptococcus pyogenes* – CSF, blood or sterile site
- Penicillin-resistant *Streptococcus pneumoniae*, invasive
- Vancomycin-resistant *Enterococcus spp.* isolated from CSF, blood, sterile site
- Glycopeptide resistant *Staph spp.* and *Strep spp.* isolated from anybody site
- Multiple antibiotic resistant bacteria

Written report within 24 hours

Report within 24 hours

- Chancroid
- Chlamydia, including neonatal conjunctivitis
- Gonorrhea
- Granuloma inguinale
- Lymphogranuloma venereum
- Syphilis, all stages and congenital

Occupational and Environmental Diseases, Injuries, and Poisonings

Report within 30 days after diagnosis or treatment

- Work-related asthma (possible, probable, and confirmed)

- Silicosis
- Asbestosis
- Pneumoconiosis, other and unspecified
- Extrinsic allergic alveolitis
- Lead, mercury, cadmium, arsenic toxicity in adults
- Work-related injury in children (those aged < 18 years)
- Work-related fatal injury
- Occupational dermatitis
- Poisoning caused by known or suspected occupational exposure
- Pesticide toxicity
- Work-related carpal tunnel syndrome
- Other occupational disease
